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Political Science Tel-Aviv University Political Science Haifa University The Israel election study of 2001 was conducted through a telephone survey between January 7 and February 4, 2001. The field work was conducted by "Mahshov" institute. The questionnaire was edited by Asher Arian from the department of Political Science at Haifa University and Michal Shamir from the department of Political Science at Tel-Aviv University.

The sample is a stratified sample that represents the population of eligible voters and includes 1,417 interviewees: 1,249 Jews and 168 Arabs. In each of the four weeks of data collection a random sample of voters' population was interviewed in each stratum. The Arab interviewees were interviewed in Arabic; the Jewish interviewees were interviewed in Hebrew or Russian.

Not all interviewees were asked the same questions, which is noted in the questionnaire, next to the question. The answers to each question are representative since in every week a random sample of the pubic was interviewed, and only the number of respondents for each question is smaller.

For example: Question 16a was asked only in the last two weeks of the survey (from 14.1.2001 on). In other words, only half of the sample replied to it. Other questions were asked only in the Jewish or Arab sectors.

All findings are specified here according to the questionnaire's structure. The questionnaire presents a question and a specification of the possible answers, including the punch number of the answers. The numbering of the questions was done according to the edited data file, i.e., a question's number is also the number of the answer's column on the data row. The data for each interviewee is gathered in two rows and a notation indicates the beginning of the second row.
